CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Being the affiliated institute, the institute implements the curriculum prescribed by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences (RGUHS), Bengaluru. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the following process is developed and deployed. Plan for effective implementation of curriculum: At the outset, the Principal of the college conducts meetings with the various department heads to develop strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum. Teachers are encouraged to impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as presentations, assignments, discussions, workshops, seminars and dental camps. We follow the academic calendar provided by the University which is circulated to all departments at the beginning of the academic year we prepare teaching plan. The college encourages its faculty members to participate in Orientation/ Refresher Courses/ Workshops/ Seminars organized by the college/university so as to update their knowledge and to improve the teaching practices. The college provides ample books and other teaching and reference materials like journals, magazines and software to enable its teachers to ensure effective delivery of curriculum. Library committee conducts meeting and takes appropriate decision regarding the requirement and procurement of books, journals, e-journals. Academic committees meet regularly ensuring staff have opportunities for keeping their skills and knowledge up to date, encouraging faculty members to evaluate their own learning and teaching practice, encouraging innovation in learning and teaching - planning how practice can be shared amongst lecturers conducting with various international faculties. A regular meeting is conducted by the head of the departments in their concerned department regarding topic distribution and necessary steps taken to improve student performance. The students in the department are motivated to gain strong fundamental knowledge, acquire enough managerial skill and develop an inclination for lifelong learning. The teaching and laboratory plans are approved by Head of Department (HOD) before the start of the academic year and communicated to students by respective course teacher. IQAC monitors the academic activities on regular basis to ensure the execution of timetable. It also monitors execution of academic calendar and teaching learning process and finds the gap, if any. For a group of around 3 undergraduate students a teacher is allocated as Mentor and he does the counselling of poor performing students. The academic performance of students is continuously monitored by conducting unit tests, mock practical examinations during the academic year. Special classes are organized and conducted for the first-year students to help them understand basic concepts of dental surgery. Employing learner centric techniques such as assignments, peer learning, group discussion, use of webinars, case studies, projects, quiz etc., in the delivery of the academic courses. Views of experts from academia and alumni on curriculum are taken regularly. Feedback from institutes and hospitals where our students are working, and alumni is given due importance in defining graduate attributes and design of course outcomes.

The college has modern infrastructure and latest equipment for the needs of students and staff. The facilities will be updated every year as per the need basis. There are various committees which will look after the maintenance and utilization of physical, academic and support facilities. Laboratory: Laboratories are used by undergraduate students and post graduate students. Lab in-charge staff and Head of the department take care of the labs. All the research activities by the students and staff will be done in the labs including central research lab after taking permission from concerned staff. Library and computers: Navodaya Central Library is fully automated with the EasyLib management software. Library will be open from 9.00 am to 11.00 pm. Library has 24 hours studying room with discussion cubicles and hygienic cafeteria. Every year latest editions of books, journals and computer systems will be procured after seeking approval from management through Library committee. User can search the books by Author, Title, Subject and keywords using OPAC kiosk. Also the users can know the latest editions of periodicals, books and the status of the books and journals. Library will be issuing 02 books to UG students for 7 days, 04 books including journals to PG students for 15 days and 05 books to faculties for 90 days. At the end of due date they can renew the books. To enter the Digital Library and to access electronic resource provided by RGUHS HELINET consortium students and faculty have to enter the user details in the Log book. Central Library is providing free wifi service. Library is also having three audio visual rooms (conference halls) of three different seating capacity which can be used after taking permission from Registrar, NET. Library provides 20 systems for RGUHS digital evaluation. Computer maintenance will be done by system admin once in a month. Sports complex: The campus has outdoor sports facilities like basketball ground, volleyball ground, throwball ground, football ground, cricket ground, 400 meter standard track and indoor sports facilities like table tennis, chess, carom, boy's gym, girl's gym which can be used by students and staff of Navodaya dental college. Physical education director is in charge for department of sports and these facilities can be used after taking his permission. Physical education director takes the permission from Principal to conduct RGUHS tournaments. In 2018-19, RGUHS, Gulbarga zone level crickettournament, RGUHS inter zone cricket tournament cum selection trials were organised.
